In December 2017, the ANC elected a new President, Cyril Ramaphosa. This event is being widely celebrated as a 'new dawn', that is, as an opportunity to deal with the corruption and economic mismanagement and opportunity to restore the constitutional project and return government to action on the basis of sound policies.

Civil society and academic, along with constitutional bodies, several courageous journalists and some ANC members themselves have played an important part in this renewal.

In the spirit of this democratic opening, the Public Affairs Research Institute, working in partnership with a broader civil-society, will host a major conference on reconstructing public institutions in South Africa in the aftermath of state capture.
