Acts on Decent and Insurgent Architectures

We are in a state of urban free fall—an accelerating poly-crisis shaped by deep bureaucratic, social, and political entanglements that hinder meaningful change. Despite our expertise and resources, we continue to fail in imagining and building inclusive, prosperous African cities. The urban landscape is increasingly defined by unchecked informal networks, broad systemic failures and privatised growth that fortifies inequality. In this moment, we must move beyond naive optimism and instead engage with the urgency and complexity of our condition. As an architect and urbanist, I am interested in the role of design to materially and imaginatively provide for stabilisation and prosperity in volatile, resource-scarce contexts. South Africa's townships, with their raw, unregulated, and entrepreneurial dynamics, offer critical insight into how collapse and emergence coexist. These spaces present opportunities to rethink urbanity-not through distant ideals, but by confronting present realities and mobilising our creative, intellectual, and economic capacities for immediate, grounded transformation. There's a hunch, that the emergent languages and practices from the townships, critically framed, may provide a tangible and imaginative approach to thinking about the future of Johannesburg's urban spaces.

THIRESHEN GOVENDER is a

Johannesburg-based architect, urbanist, and researcher, and the founder of UrbanWorks, a design-research studio focused on transformative infrastructures in post-traumatic urban contexts. His work—spanning authorship, international teaching, and research explores informal economies, speculative design, and the hidden forces shaping cities in crisis.
